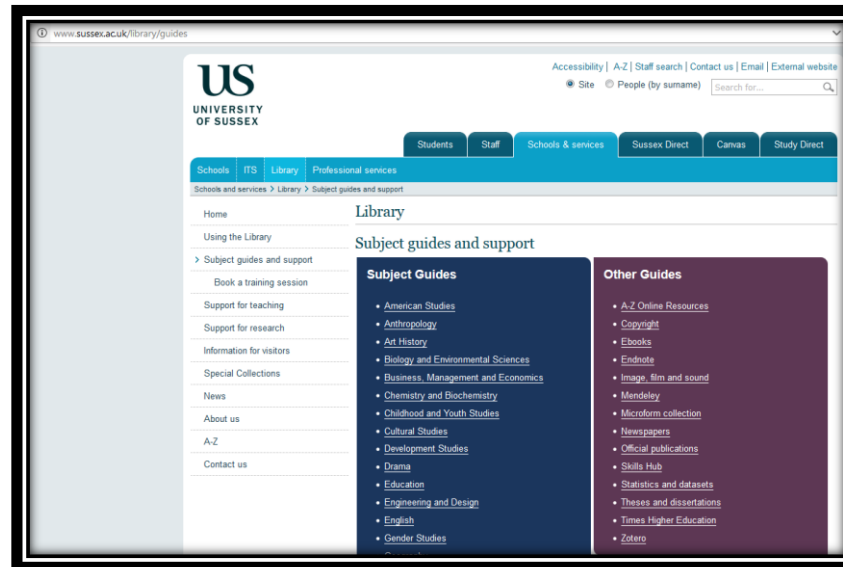


Library Subject Guides list key resources such as specialist subject databases and digital archives.

New "LTI" tool to embed Library Subject Guides into Canvas

- Tutors can now embed material from Library Subject Guides directly into Canvas, so that students can more easily find, access and use the resources.
- LTI = Learning Tools Interoperability

Option 1) Add a new item to an existing Canvas unit – from Slide 6 of this guide

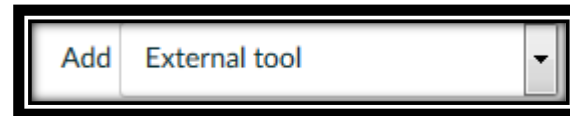
Option 2) Add a new Page in Canvas – from Slide 11 of this guide

Option 1: Add a new item to an existing unit

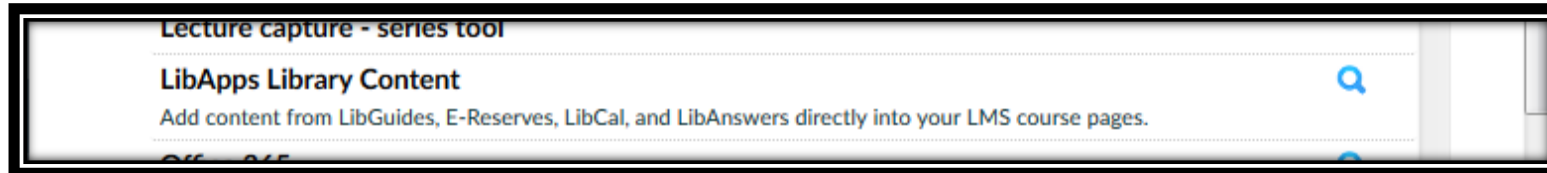
1. In the relevant unit, click "+" (on the right)



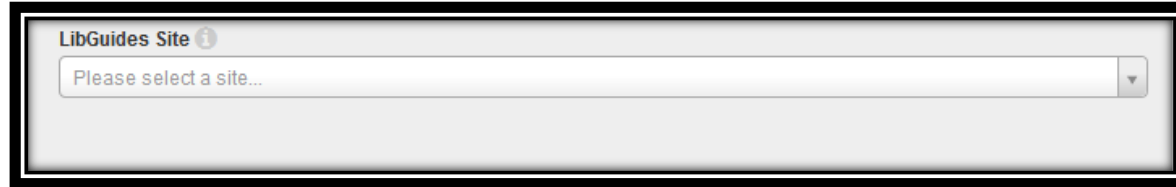
2. Add "External Tool"



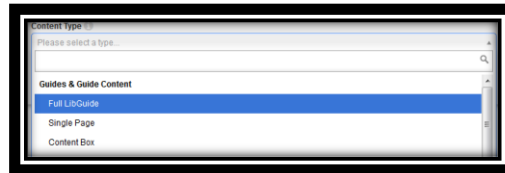
3. Select "Lib Apps Library Content"



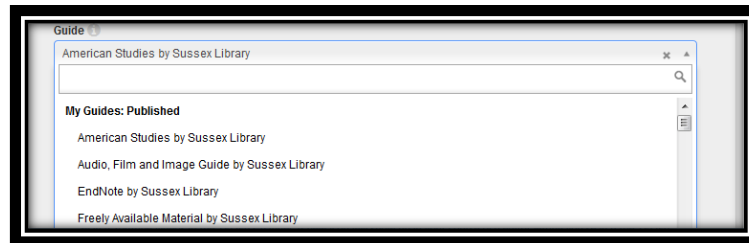
4. Choose "Lib Guides – guides.lib.sussex.ac.uk"



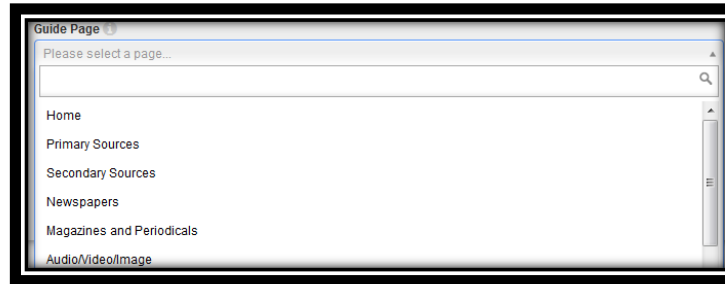
5. Choose the content type you want. You can embed a "Full Guide", a "Single Page" from a guide, or an individual "Content Box"



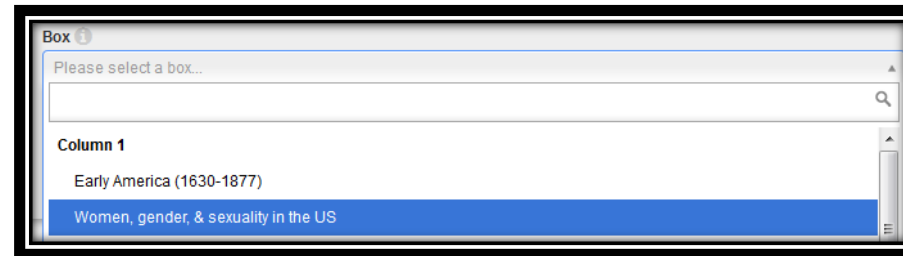
6. Choose the library subject guide from which you are embedding material (American Studies, Physics and Astronomy, etc.)



7. If relevant, choose the single page from the guide you want.



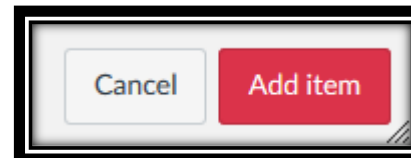
8. If relevant, choose the individual content box



9. Once you are ready, click embed content.




10. "Add Item"



The item now appears in your Canvas unit.

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Click on the item and click "View Content" to view as a student.

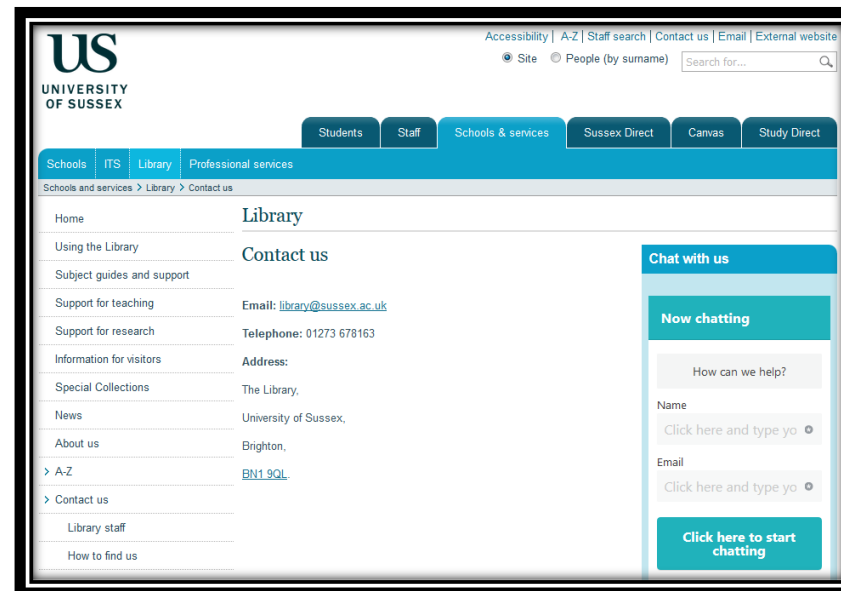

- **Early American Imprints, Series I (Evans, 1639-1800)**

Key titles include the New York Herald, New York Tribune, Philadelphia Inquirer, Baltimore Sun, South Carolina City Gazette, Dallas Morning News, Kansas City Star, San Jose Mercury News.
- **Early American Newspapers 1803-1916: The American West**
The largest online collection of 19th-century U.S. newspapers from the American West. Approx. 2,500 titles published in all 24 states west of the Mississippi River; plus a number of titles published east of the Mississippi for valuable political and economic content.
- **Slavery, Abolition and Social Justice**
Brings together documents and collections between 1490 and 2007. Looks at varieties of slavery, its legacy, the social-justice perspective and the continued existence of slavery today. Also useful secondary sources, including an interactive map, scholarly essays, tutorials, a visual sources gallery, chronology and bibliography.
- **Early Americas Digital Archive**
A collection of electronic texts and links to texts originally written in or about the Americas from 1492 - c. 1820.
- **Cornell University Making of American Collection**
A digital library of primary sources in American social history from the antebellum period through reconstruction. Subject areas: education, psychology, American history, sociology, religion, and science and technology.

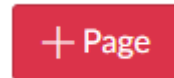


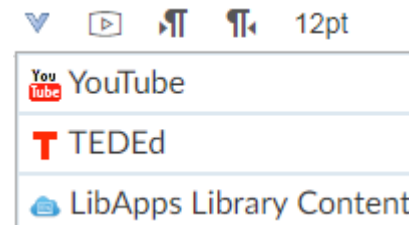
1. "+ Page" (on the right)
